ABOUT GABRIELA MISTRAL



Gabriela Mistral was born on April 7, 1889 in the city of Vicuña as Lucila de María del Perpetuo Socorro Godoy Alcayaga. She was a Chilean poet, educator, diplomat and feminist and was the first Latin American woman to be awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1945. Gabriela was born and raised in remote rural areas of northern Chile where, from an early age, she was in close contact with the poor. Gabriela started helping her family by working as a

Teacher's Aid in the public school system, and later pursued a career as a teacher while writing the poetry that made her internationally famous. She taught at schools throughout Chile and developed a deep love and commitment to the poor—especially to the children—of her country. Her literary successes gave her international recognition. In 1922 she accepted an invitation from the President of Mexico to join in the nation's plan to reform libraries and schools, and to start a national education system. She also toured and lectured extensively in Europe and the United States. As many other educators of her time she was also appointed consul in many different cities, including Madrid, Lisbon, Nice, Petrópolis, Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, Veracruz, Naples and New York where she taught at Barnard College of Columbia University. She resided in New York until she died of cancer on January 10, 1957.
